Mark 10:23 (ESV) - And Jesus looked around and said to his disciples, "How difficult it will be for those who have wealth to enter the kingdom of God!"

Matthew 6:21 (ESV) - For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Matthew 6:24 (ESV) - "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money.

Many rich people put in large sums. 42 And a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. 43 And he called his disciples to him and said to them, "Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the offering box. 44 For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

2 Corinthians 9:6-7 (ESV) - The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. 7 Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

2 Corinthians 9:10-11 (ESV) - He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. 11 You will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God.

Who Has Your Heart?

The message says, "Want to know what you value? Follow your money." What does following your money reveal about your current priorities?

If intentionally redirecting your treasure can redirect your heart, where might God be inviting you to intentionally invest so your heart follows?

How do these testimonies inspire you to move beyond simply asking, "What can I afford to give?" toward asking, "God, what would obedience and generosity look like for me?"

What does it look like practically to have money without allowing money to have you?

Why do you think Jesus was more impressed by the widow's small gift than the much larger gifts being given around her?

How can we pursue sacrificial generosity without allowing guilt, comparison, pressure, or manipulation to become our motivation?

Treasure Directs the Heart

How have you experienced generosity changing your heart toward God, people, or His mission?

What is the difference between giving God what is comfortable and genuinely surrendering our resources to Him?

The Testimonies of Generosity

What stood out to you most from the testimonies of people choosing to give sacrificially, regardless of how much they had?

How do these stories inspire or challenge you personally to trust God, live generously, and ask Him what He would have you give?
